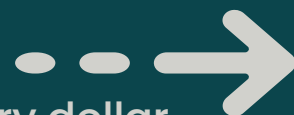

## Message from the President/CEO Safely Transitioning Back to Growth & Sustainability

Last year was another amazing year! While still navigating through COVID 19 and health restrictions, UCP fully re-opened all in-person programming, bringing the individuals we serve back to see the staff that missed seeing their faces in-person every day. We saw many other successes as well, including having the highest safety record we have seen since tracking incidents in 1997. The success of the staff's focus on safety gave UCP a 99% safety record, earning UCP a Gold Award from our insurance. In addition, UCP saw growth in our transportation department, purchasing 10 new vehicles, hiring 20 new drivers, and adding routes in Placerville. We also officially launched the UCP Recreation program, providing a much-needed service for clients and families. Over the next year, with the community's support, UCP will focus on strategic growth, safety, and ensuring we meet the needs of the community we serve.

### Creating Opportunities Now, for Options Tomorrow

This year, UCP launched our new Recreation Program in order to meet the needs of our clients and families. The goal of the program is to provide individuals with developmental disabilities, and their families, the opportunity to experience things they may not otherwise get to. One of our families shared an amazing story with us about how UCP's recreation program impacted their children's lives.

"With UCP we have found a whole new world of family friendly activities, outings and events our kids could participate in that were adapted to fit their needs where we didn't have to miss out on some part of some event or activity because they were unable to do it like the other kids out there in the world. Because of UCP, our boys have been able to go camping at a family camp with us where our wheelchair bound son could actually do all the activities like a regular kid! He wasn't confined to his chair and was actually able to go zip lining!! This was HUGE!... our kids have gotten to see Santa in a sensory friendly environment with friends just like them, they have gotten to play soccer and go to Disney on Ice and everything was specifically set up to meet their individual needs I they could actually participate in EVERYTHING."

## Life Witout Limits, At Every Stage of Life

We are proud to say that our programs and services have a positive impact on our clients and their families in many capacities. Providing support to our clients and their families from infancy and adapting into adulthood.

This means providing over 23,000 hours a month of Respite Care services to families, with a majority of the clients being 18 or younger. These hours provide much a much-needed break to help support caregivers who are working 24 hours a day caring for their children. UCP's youngest client is a young girl named Nyeli, at almost two years old she is the youngest person receiving UCP Services . She was diagnosed with Down syndrome and developmental delays and her parents needed some extra support from UCP.

UCP's Adult Day Programs help support individuals in their next stages in life. Each program works on developing and providing daily living skills, verbal and non-verbal communication, person centered planning and showing participants they are valued members of our community. One of our clients, Gary, has been with UCP since 2008 and is one of our oldest clients at 82. Gary attends our Twin Rivers II campus and enjoys helping in the classroom as much as possible such as watering the garden, putting things away, taking out the trash, cleaning up messes, and helping others however he can. While at the program, Gary really enjoys listening to music and dancing.
